Basic theoretical approaches such as realism, liberalism, international society, social constructivism, Marxist approaches will be examined and key methodological discussions will be introduced. During the course, important international current developments are tried to be explained and analyzed through analytical perspectives. Students studying this course should be able to compare theoretical approaches in International Relations and show the similarities and differences between them.			

<b>INTR2005</b>	<b>History of Political Thought</b>	<b>3+0+0</b>	<b>ECTS:5</b>
<b>Content of the Course:</b> This course introduces students with main strands of political thought both in Europe and beyond Europe. The course delves into one ideology in each week and teaches students each ideology with its historical context and specific meaning for International Relations (IR). Throughout the end, the course moves beyond the political ideologies that have marked the European history and visits the so-called other political ideologies underpinned histories of India, the Middle East, and Africa.			

<b>INTR2007</b>	<b>World History - I</b>	<b>3+0+0</b>	<b>ECTS:5</b>
<b>Content of the Course:</b> This course covers all of human history from the emergence of humanity to the 1500s. It will be studied the history of major world cultures, and empires of world history. This course will also handle larger themes in world history, such as trade, the development of technology, the spread of religions, and the historical relationship between societies.

<p>Since the middle of the 20th century, attention has somewhat shifted to discussing democracy problems. Conventionally, however, the dominant approach has still been centered on how to establish and sustain democratic values, institutions, and safeguards for individual rights against the legacy of the state-dominant single party authoritarianism and the secularism imperative. The undying legacies of the modern 'Leviathan', the Turkish state, has been assumed to lead to exclusion, essentializing, marginalization, and militarization of non-state actors. The end result is the emasculation of democracy. An extension of this stand is that the 'enlightened' agenda of Turkey's modernizing elite is threatened by the 'resistance' of the excluded. Under this context, IR and Public Adm. students so far who studied World History, Ottoman History and European Political History needs to learn contemporary historical developments also which most of them are the causes of current conflicts or issues. During Political History course starting from mid-19th century world events including Ottoman modernization and fall, foundation of Modern Turkish Republic will be tackled with.</p>

### 3rd Year- Fall Semester

<b>INTR3001</b>	<b>Turkish Foreign Policy - I</b>	<b>3+0+0</b>	<b>ECTS:5</b>
<b>Content of the Course:</b>			
<p>Turkish Foreign Policy (TFP-I) starts from the last century of Ottoman Empire. Especially beginning from Abdulhamit II's reign (1876-1909) TFP has tracked a balance policy considering conflicting interests of big powers. It could be said that balance policy provided survival of collapsing Ottoman Empire for a while. During the rule of Ittihat Terakki, Union and Progress (UPP) (1909-1918) traditional had some grave changes but during and after National Struggle it again based on its long-lasting balance policy. During Republican era except annexation of Hatay (1939) and two Peace Operations to Cyprus (July, August 1974) TFP continued to track its traditions policy making method. After the collapse of Ottoman Empire the transformation into a national state brought some grave problems and TFP inevitably closely has been affected by that developments. Because of said reasons TFP is not a story of success neither during the last century of Ottoman Empire nor during the Republican era. Challenges, incapability, difficulties, historical ties (Balkans and Middle East) and Turkish legacy all around the world are the basic problems TFP makers should cope with. TFP makers, bearing in mind that difficulties try to implement a policy which will make Turkey an international actor. In this Class: basic concepts of foreign policy will be underlined, with a critical viewing will be evaluated. Freedom of speech is the basic of the class and the period 1912-1980 will be the main time span that would be tackled with. Thus analytical skills of undergraduate student will be focused on.</p>

<b>Content of the Course:</b> <p>The Ottoman Empire was able to preserve its multi-identity and multi-religious structure for centuries. The nationalist movements emerged with the French Revolution and the Ottoman minorities provoked by the European powers and missionaries began to separate from the whole in the last century of the Empire as a result of the activities of the marginalized groups within themselves to terrorize the society. Terrorism and persecution activities organized by the Dashnak-Hinchak committee members between 1894 and 1896 also brought the end of the trouble-free life of the Ottoman Armenians in the Empire. The Committeemen terrorized both their own society and the Ottoman Empire. The aim is to support the cult activities by gaining legitimacy before the Great Powers. Missionaries and Western newspapers have more than met the expectation of the committee members to direct the public opinion. After the 1877-1878 Ottoman-Russian War, the Armenian Question was added to the problems that the Ottoman Empire had to deal with. Until this date, the Armenian Question was not given much attention by the Great Powers. However, starting from the Berlin Conference (1878), while the Great Powers encouraged the destructive activities of the Armenian Committee and its committee members, they considered the uprisings as ready excuses to interfere in the Ottoman internal affairs.</p>
